



## Availability of alcohol











In the UK, 71% of licensed premises are licensed to sell alcohol for on-premises consumption. Between 2012 and 2018, the number of licensed premises in the UK fell by 0.5%.


The number of off-licences rose 5%.

## How many personal licences to sell alcohol are there in England and Wales?

The number of personal licences to sell alcohol in England and Wales rose 43%, from 505,000 in 2012 to 723,800 in 2018.

Annual net changes in licences granted





## How many personal licences to sell alcohol are there in Scotland?



The number of personal licences to sell alcohol in Scotland rose 45%, from 40,286 in 2012 to 58,462 in 2018.

Annual net changes in licences granted



## How many 24-hr licences to sell alcohol are there in England and Wales?



The number of 24-hr licences to sell alcohol in England and Wales reached its peak in 2012 (8,400), declining slightly to 8,100 premises with 24-hour alcohol licences, as of 31 March 2018.

As of 31 March 2018, hotel bars (3,200) were most likely to have 24-hr alcohol licences, followed by supermarkets and stores (2,700). 700 pubs, bars and nightclubs owned a 24-hr alcohol licence.
